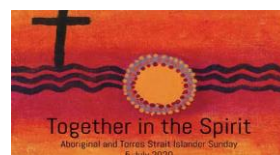

General Guidelines: Latest Update (19th June)

Temporary Times at St. Kevin's Church for Weekday Masses only permit up to 20 people. The four square metre rule still applies, as well as the maintenance of the Records Book and the hygiene and disinfectant measures. The doors are locked at the start of Mass.

More than Three Months!

It has been more than three months since we began to experience the effects of the imposed restrictions due to the pandemic. We have been through various phases: the suspension of public liturgies (churches closed), then permitted to have ten in the church, and now currently twenty. Preparations were in place in order to have fifty in the church. However, as is known, there has been a set-back affecting the whole of Victoria, but with particular "hot spots". The start of the journey in St. Kevin's Parish occurred with an Extraordinary Meeting of the Parish Pastoral Council on Thursday, 19th March. The following Sunday (22nd March) was the Fourth Sunday of Lent for which Mass was recorded. The recording of Sunday Mass has continued since that time in late March. Obviously, a number of factors needed to come together to be of advantage for parishioners. Howard Fernandez (PPC member), assisted by George Iraheta, resurrected the parish website and incorporated a YouTube channel for the viewing of Sunday Mass and important recorded announcements. In addition, Howard arranged that parish information could be accessed through Facebook. When I returned to the parish, it quickly became very clear to me how much coordination work Howard had been doing regarding the liturgies in the church. From the outset, Khuram Jawad willingly undertook the recording and editing work. Remi Xavier, from time to time, has also given a helping hand. Not only has Khuram consistently seen to the work of recording and editing the Sunday Mass since the Fourth Sunday of Lent, up until about six week ago he recorded Wednesday Mass and Novena. Khuram's faithful dedication is to be admired. At the same time, Sanele and Ami Leumoana (sacristans) oversaw and attended to all that was needed in the church. Where would we be without them?! Their reliability and the way they look after the church is a special gift to the whole parish. It has been a marvellous cooperative effort across several areas of parish involvement. Here, for now, I choose to highlight these three: the website (with youtube channel), the recording work, and the preparation of the church. It has been a long sustained effort of tangible service from that time in late March. On behalf of the parish, I thank them most sincerely,
