

## <u>The Mass – The Alleluia Verse</u>

Alleluia is one of two Hebrews words that have endured untranslated for use in the Mass. (The other is Amen.)

Alleluia (sometimes spelled Hallelujah) mean "Praise the Lord". That is what we do when we rise to hear the proclamation of the Gospel.

Praise is the purest form of prayer, because it seeks nothing for itself, but only God's glory. We ask God for good things. We thank God for graces we have received. Our gratitude, however, moves us to consider not just what God has done for us, but who God is. And so we praise the Lord.

The Hebrew word Hallelujah has, since ancient times, been an important part of the Passover celebration of the Jews. It is a key word in certain Psalms, called Hallel or "Praise" Psalms. In the time of Jesus, when the Jerusalem Temple was still standing, the assisting priests (the Levites) would chant a group of these Psalms (113-118) continuously during the sacrifice of the Passover lambs. Families would chant two of these Psalms (113-114) during the Passover meal at home. This was probably the "hymn" that Jesus and his disciples sang at the end of the Last Supper (see Matthew 26:30 and Mark 14:26). Thus, this classic expression of praise—Alleluia! —has always been integral to the Passover, and so it became an important part of the Christian celebration of the Paschal Mystery.

Consider the reasons devout Jews have given for their praise. In the Talmud (from about AD 200) we can find the oldest account of the rites of the Passover meal: "In every generation a man must so regard himself as if he came forth himself out of Egypt ... He brought us out from bondage to freedom, from sorrow to gladness, and from mourning to a festival day, and from darkness to great light, and from servitude to redemption; so, let us say before him the Hallelujah."

This is what Jesus was celebrating with his closest friends at the Last Supper. It is what he continues to celebrate with us at every Mass. Now he delivers us—out from bondage to freedom, from sorrow to gladness, from

mourning to joy, from darkness to light, from slavery to redemption. This is the meaning of our salvation. This is the gift we have received with the Gospel. And so when we stand to receive the Gospel, we raise our own great *Hallel*. We say or sing *Alleluia*.

The Book of Revelation depicts heavenly worship as the "Marriage Supper of the Lamb", replete with many Passover images and prayers. Chapter 19 shows heaven and earth chanting praise irrepressibly—with four Hallelujahs in just six verses. It is a great festival of praise, as is our experience of Mass.

After this I heard, as it seemed, the voices of countless multitudes crying out in heaven, **Alleluia**; salvation and glory and power belong to our God; his sentence is ever true and just, and now he has given sentence against the great harlot, who poisoned the earth with her harlot's ways; now he has called her to account for the blood of his servants. And again, they cried, **Alleluia**, the smoke of her burning goes up everlastingly. Then the twenty-four elders and the four living figures fell down and worshipped God, where he sits enthroned, crying, Amen, **Alleluia**. And a voice came from the throne, which said, Praise our God, all you that are his servants, and all you that fear him, little and great alike; whereupon I heard, as it seemed, the noise of a great multitude, like the noise of water in flood, or the noise of deep thunder, as they cried out, **Alleluia**, the Lord our God, the Almighty, has claimed his kingdom; let us rejoice and triumph and give him the praise; the time has come for the wedding feast of the Lamb. (Revelation 19:1-7)

The Church omits the Alleluia during the season of Lent, for reasons that should be obvious. During Lent we cultivate a longing to celebrate the Passover of Jesus Christ, his Paschal Mystery: his Easter. As we wait, we look forward to the time of the *Hallel*, the season of *Alleluia*. At Easter Vigil, we restore the *Alleluia*, and the churches ring out with praise at the good news.

## 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter – Year B

#### 1st Reading – Acts 4:8-12

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter said: 'Rulers of the people, and elders! If you are questioning us today about an act of kindness to a cripple, and asking us how he was healed, then I am glad to tell you all, and would indeed be glad to tell the whole people of Israel, that it was by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, the one you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by this name and by no other that this man is able to stand up perfectly healthy, here in your presence, today. This is the stone rejected by you the builders, but which has proved to be the keystone. For of all the names in the world given to men, this is the only one by which we can be saved.'

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

### **Gospel Acclamation**

### Gospel – John 10:11-18

Jesus said:

'I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep.

The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep.

'I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd.

'The Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me; I lay it down of my own free will, and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been given by my Father.'
